RECTOR's RAMBLINGS . . . What Does Lent Challenge us to Do?

A little over two month ago on December 26th, the day after Christmas, the most frequently asked question was "So, what did you get?" Asked by family members and friends, it was also asked by people who were standing in line waiting to return the gifts they had received just the day before. The Great Post-Christmas swap - taking the gifts you received and trading them in for something else.

As Christians enter into the season of Lent, the Christmas question of "What did you get" is completely turned around. The most familiar of all Lenten questions, is – "So, what are you giving up?"

Quite often the response is something that we can afford to set aside, like chocolate or dessert or the eating of a particular type of food. When we examine these choices, we realize that they are all optional, chosen from among the cornucopia of abundance that surrounds us. In the end, the things we often give up for Lent weren't anything that we really needed for our survival.

And then there's the matter of setting a limit on our newly-chosen discipline – in the case of Lent it is but seven weeks long and then we go back to what we were doing before. Can anything that's merely a temporary adjustment to our lifestyle or eating habits bring about any real change? Do we approach Lent with the thought that the denial of some bodily treat is what it is truly all about? Is not Lent, the season of penitence and self-examination, about something more spiritually and physically deeper? Is it a test of my will power in some game of food choices, or a time to allow God to challenge and strengthen my faith in some real and meaningful way?

I am not demeaning the small choices that anyone might make, but at the same time I am imploring each of us to dare to go deeper. The question to ask ourselves is not what we can give up for a season, but what change in our life we can we make right now that will bring us closer to the glory of God for the rest of our lives?

Perhaps that's too big a question to answer immediately or within the next week or so. However, we must never be afraid to wrestle with the big questions. Faith and trust in God is not built upon safe choices, but on bold action, and intention, and risk. *(continued p.2)*

Jesus, after his baptism, was not driven into the wilderness as if it where some sort of post-graduation present. His time in the wilderness was not a rest period. It was the time for him to place his survival into the hands of the Father, to claim his ministry as his own, to realize that having begun the journey of faith there would be no turning back. He was not to return to the carpenter's shop in Nazareth. What he gave up was his old life in order to be a vehicle for bringing new life into the world.

We are called to walk in his steps, not gingerly stepping along carpeted aisles of a church, but steadfastly seeking new pathways in the wilderness. As Christians we bear the name of Christ. Our Lenten journey of forty days will only have meaning if it is truly another step in claiming the faith that God has placed within us.

What is it that we are called to give up for Lent?

Only our fears, ourselves, our all.

For those children in grades 5 and lower, we have been studying about Mary and Martha. Jesus comes to Mary and Martha's house for a visit. Mary proceeds to sit down to listen to Jesus, while Martha does things around the house to prepare for her guests. Martha gets upset with Mary for not helping with the chores and asks Jesus to tell Mary to help her. Jesus tells her that Mary has chosen wisely. He

reminds us to take time out for God.

As part of these studies, the kids created their own TV show, "The Mary and Martha Show". They directed it themselves, and our new music director, Keith Saint John provided theme music. Overall it is highly entertaining. We had a mini showing at the Mardi Gras dinner. However, if you missed it, we are hoping to have another showing sometime in the future. So stay tuned.

Other stuff on the radar screen...we have been playing the 13th Apostle game. The premise is that you are the 13th Apostle. You have to answer trivia questions, kind of like Trivial Pursuit, to collect all twelve Apostles along with bread and wine and get to the Last Supper. We have lots of fun while getting to learn a lot about Jesus and His Apostles.

Closer to Easter, we will be baking resurrection rolls. Take a marshmallow (Christ's body) and roll it in melted butter (oil for anointing). Then take the buttered mallow and roll it in cinnamon and sugar (burial spices). All that gets encased in a crescent roll (the tomb) and baked. Then...Surprise!!...Jesus is no longer in the tomb, almost like magic and very delicious. This is a very tactile way for kids to experience the wonder of Easter and Jesus' resurrection.

In between all those activities, we are sure to watch a movie or two and work on some neat crafts. Once it gets warmer, the kids are going to go on an adventure over to the church yard to learn more about our church's history.

We have some really exciting things planned for grades 5 and younger. Who says Sunday School has to be boring? No way!! And as always, all are welcome, kids, grandkids, nephews, nieces, friends, the more the merrier; we meet 9 - 10 AM in the Parish Hall.

Items can be donated to the food closet at any time. Here are some of the most popular items that are always in short supply:



Author Timothy Perry presents a Mary who belongs in Lent as much as in Advent, showing what it means to die and live with the crucified and risen Jesus. Drawing primarily from the Gospel of Luke, this

book of spiritual reflections reveals a Lenten Mary who teaches us about being disciples. The result is a complex, inviting, strong character – a disciple to be emulated by all Christians, especially during this holy season. Fr. Jim is leading a five-week book study beginning the week of February 27th. You have your choice of attending the morning sessions at 10:00am on Mondays, or the evening sessions at 7:00pm on Tuesdays (preceded by a soup supper starting at 6:15pm). ST. JAMES CHURCH MILL CREEK VESTRY MEETING MINUTES February 13, 2012

PRESENT: Fr. James Bimbi; Bruce Vrana; Cindy Fauerbach; Elinor Knodel; Kathy Kwiatkowski; Gail Zimmerman; Steve Prescott; Marsha Cauthen

ABSENT: Carolyn Joynt; Jennifer Idell

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Vestry of St. James Church Mill Creek was called to order at 7:25 pm by Senior Warden, Bruce Vrana. Fr. Jim led the Vestry in an opening prayer.

AGENDA: Approved as presented

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING: Approved

TREASURER'S REPORT: No Treasurer's Report presented. Steve will circulate the Treasurer's Report to the Vestry. The Vestry discussed the trusts that St. James has and how some of the interest helped to make-up the 2011 deficit.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

A. **Thank-you Notes:** The Clerk will write thank-you notes to the following: Cathy Goldstone for her years of service on the Flower Guild and for serving as its Chairperson.

NEW BUSINESS:

- 1. **Vestry Elections/Re-elections**: Two Vestry members' terms end this year, Jennifer Idell and Elinor Knodel. They will serve on the Election Committee. While Cindy Fauerbach is eligible for an additional two-year term, she is not seeking re-election. Marsha Cauthen resigned as Clerk of the Vestry and as a Vestry member effective immediately. In summary, there are two (2) outstanding one-year terms; three (3) open two-year terms; two (2) members up for re-election (Bruce Vrana and Steve Prescott); and three (3) continuing Vestry members (Carolyn Joynt, Gail Zimmerman, and Kathy Kwiatkowski . Elections will be held during the Annual Meeting on April 22, 2012. Any member of St. James that is age 16 up may serve as a member of the Vestry.
- 2. **Civil Unions**: Fr. Jim reported that on January 28, 2012, St. James hosted the Dialogue on Civil Unions attended by Episcopal clergy and parishioners from the area.

RECTOR'S REPORT:

A. Fr. Jim reported that a Tracy Burns, leader of the dress project, is organizing and moving the dresses to the Christiana Hilton for a sale in early March. A group known as Students Today, Leaders Forever (STLF) is coming to Wilmington for one day on February 24, 2012. There is the possibility that the high school students of STLF may help with the dress project. The group would need a place to stay. The Vestry discusses the possibility of allowing the group to stay overnight in the Parish House. Fr. Jim has a copy of the Certificate of Liability Insurance for STLF.

B. COMMITTEE REPORTS:

- A. **Worship**: Cindy Fauerbach reported that the Flower Guild is being restructured. Cathy Goldstone agreed to serve as the Calendar and Contact Person for the Flower Guild. Cindy reported that the choir is excited to have Keith St. John as our Minister of Music and she encouraged interested parishioners to join the choir.
- B. **Property:** Kathy Kwiatkowski reported there was a water leak inside a closet in the downstairs Choir Room. The leak has been repaired and the mold has been removed. The Property Committee will obtain estimates for repairs and improvements to the restrooms in the Parish House.
- C. **Finance:** Steve Prescott reported that the FAC will meet later this month.
- D. **Parish Life**: Cindy reported that the next meeting will be held on March 4th after the 10:15 am service.
- E. **Mission & Outreach**: Gail Zimmerman reported that St. James' next hosting week begins March 25th. There was some discussion about how our hosting week may be impacted by the Annual Flea Market on March 24th.
- **F. Education:** Cindy talked with Carolyn Joynt. The younger people in the Sunday Morning Academy are filming Mary and Martha commercials. The Senior High Youth are selling tickets and serving at the Shrove Tuesday dinner on February 21, 2012.

SENIOR WARDEN REPORT: Bruce reminded the Vestry of the upcoming Annual Meeting on April 22, 2012. There will be one service at 9:00 am followed by breakfast and the Annual Meeting. The Vestry will host the breakfast. Bruce asked that Committee Chairperson prepare their reports for the Annual Meeting and that they submit them to the church office by mid-March.

Fr. Jim reported that Family Promise renewed the three-year lease to use the Rectory as its Day Center. Per the terms of the original contract, the monthly payments to St. James increased by \$100 per month. On April 20th, Fr. Jim will attend a meeting about Family Promise with Dick Prettyman, Bruce, two Family Promise board members, and the Executive Director. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss general terms about the Contract.

Fr. Jim will be out of town on February 15th and 16th to attend a meeting of the North American Committee for St. George's College in Jerusalem.

There being no further business, the Vestry meeting concluded at 9:15 pm with the Order for Compline.

FORGIVENESS


Try this twist on musical chairs.

What you need:

- 28 large index cards
- Black marker
- Two teams of people
- Radio or CD player

What you do:

- 1. On index cards, write out forgiveness, one letter per card. Make two sets (two F's, two O's, etc.).
- 2. Mix up the cards and form them face up in a circle on the floor. (You'll have six blanks mixed in.)
- 3. Have teams mix themselves up and stand in a circle around the cards. Ask an extra person to turn the music on and off.
- 4. As the music plays, teams walk around the circle. When the music stops, players each pick up the card nearest them.
- 5. Team members take their cards to a designated area and try to spell forgiveness. Any double letters or blanks go back to the "music person," who reorganizes remaining cards, spacing them evenly into a fresh circle.
- 6. Play continues until one team spells forgiveness.
