RECTOR's RAMBLINGS . . . New Life in the Spirit and the Word

The month of April was jam-packed with events around old St. James' - Palm Sunday; the Holy Week services of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday; the Neighborhood Easter Egg Hunt and Hot Dog Lunch; Easter Morning Services of the Resurrection; a meeting of the Tercentennial Committee; and the Annual Parish Meeting. Add to this list the regularly occurring gatherings of the Bazaar Workshop, Shawl Ministry, Vestry, Property Committee, and Financial Advisory Committee, and the weekly efforts of the members of the Altar Guild and the Flower Guild, and the ongoing work of our dedicated volunteer gardeners to improve our grounds - well, you can see that much is happening and being attended to by your fellow parishioners.

As we look ahead, just over one year from now we will begin to mark our Tercentennial - the 300th anniversary of the founding of this parish. There will be a number of events and observances for us to appreciate and enjoy, and hopefully to share with many of our friends and neighbors. What we must stand ready to offer, in addition to our unique history and church building is, in the words of the Apostle Peter, our "defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting of the hope that is in you." [1Peter 3:15] In other words, we must be ready to share our Christian faith and hope. Why do we come to this church, or any church for that matter? Beyond the social gatherings and friendships, what is the experience of God that we find in our worship and ministries?

All of this is an important part of telling our story, which is a part of the God's larger story of Creation, Covenant, Salvation, Prophecy, Redemption and Sanctification. It is about the faithfulness of Abraham and Sarah, the fearlessness of Moses, the bravery of King David, the humbleness of Mary and Joseph, the humanity and divinity of Jesus Christ, the tenacity of Paul, the generosity of Lydia, and so many more.

License plate number requests will be distributed on a first come, first serve basis.

We must receive 200 applications before the State will begin printing license plates.

Here are some answers to potential questions

- Everyone should keep the original number plate. That number plate will always be with the vehicle. If you get a Diocese plate and then get rid of the Diocese plate, the number plate will stay with the vehicle.
- New plates come with new stickers (and a new registration card)
- Checks are made payable to: Episcopal Diocese of Delaware (Diocese of Delaware is also fine)
- All number requests must be numerical.

Pentecost, the church's birthday – May 27, 2012

Pentecost was originally a Jewish harvest festival when the first fruits of crops were given as offerings to God. On the first Pentecost after Jesus' resurrection, the Holy Spirit came upon Jesus' followers. They were filled with power and love, thus empowering them to witness to God's actions in Christ to all who were nearby. Some 3,000 people responded to their claims that Christ was Lord and Savior of mankind. The outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' first followers on the day of Pentecost is often called the Church's birthday. You can read the entire story in Acts 2. To symbolize the "tongues, as of fire" (Acts 2:3, NRSV) that came upon the people present at Pentecost, liturgical churches display the color red in their worship services on Pentecost Sunday. Many people attending worship wear red on that day.

St. James Episcopal Church, Mill Creek Hundred Minutes of the 2012 Annual Meeting April 22, 2012

After a single worship service at 9:00 a.m., the congregation adjourned to the Parish House for brunch provided by the Vestry and our Annual Meeting.

At 10:50 a.m. the Annual Meeting was called to order followed by an opening prayer. Sr. Warden, Bruce Vrana, welcomed everyone and thanked them for attending.

A motion was made and seconded to have Nancy Patterson take minutes of the meeting.

One person from each table stood and introduced the members sitting at that table. There were 73 church members in attendance.

A motion was made to dispense of the reading of the 2011 Minutes. The Minutes from the 2011 Annual Meeting were approved as written.

Before voting for new Vestry members, the Senior Warden thanked all members of the Vestry for their service with special acknowledgement of the outgoing members: Elinor Knodel, Jennifer Idell and Cindy Fauerbach.

There were no nominations from the floor. This year's nominees for a two-year term are: Ann Kauffman, Robert (Bob) Mecklenburg and Debbie Nuss. Those standing for re-election are: Steve Prescott and Bruce Vrana. Those filling a one-year term are: Sister Barbara Jean (BJ) Brown and Olivia Jessup. The Vestry candidates were elected by acclamation.

The Disbursing Treasurer, Sam White, presented the Financial Report. Sam called attention to pages 12-13 of the Annual Report which represents an analysis of Revenues and Expenses for St. James as a whole. Sam explained that there were several expenditures that contributed to this year's \$58,000 deficit: Repairs to the central pier under the main floor of the church (\$4,900), Concrete work (\$20,000), Repairs to Parish House steps (\$2,600), and refinishing the Parish

House floor (\$6,000). Also, investment losses were \$20,000 in 2011. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Financial Report as written.

The Year In Review

Youth Mission Trip to Nada, KY: Fr. Jim gave a brief talk about the success of the Nada, KY trip. Nine youth and 3 adults went on the trip. Fr. Jim credited Cynde Bimbi for organizing the trip. They held Vacation Bible School each day, painted the inside of one building and stained the outside of another. Most important was the time they spent visiting with neighbors and especially time spent with the youth. It was a marvelous event.

Termite Damage: The repairs to the church were completed in July and August. Terminix has paid \$18,990 to date. They will reimburse St. James an additional \$2,568 for hidden damages. It is unknown at this time when that payment will be made. Jack Parker was thanked for all his help with the project and the Property Committee was also thanked for their help.

Family Promise: Jennifer Idell thanked everyone who has helped with Family Promise. She said that the Christmas season was a turning point for the program. At that time the families had separate rooms. This gave them more privacy. Everyone still had their meals together. The families were very appreciative of the new sleeping arrangements. There is still a need for overnight hosts. All other areas have enough help at this time.

New Music Director: Keith St. John, our new music director, was welcomed. The Music Committee was thanked for their work

Food Pantry: The closet has had shelves installed so it is easier to organize all of the items. We now have a committee responsible for the Food Pantry. They are doing a good job organizing the items and checking expiration dates. We are also providing more non-food items. There continues to be a need in the community for the Food Pantry.

Good Shepherd: This is a new ministry and it is still being organized. They will provide notes, phone calls, visits to shut-ins and those who we have not seen or heard from in awhile. Fr. Jim thanked everyone who has been helping with the organizing of this ministry.

Tercentennial: Our tercentennial celebration is rapidly approaching. Several activities are being planned. The celebration will begin in July 2013 and end in June 2014. The committee will provide information about the activities as soon as dates and times are finalized. There is a need for volunteers. Anyone interested is invited to attend the meetings.

Budget: The Vestry approved a budget with a deficit of \$23,000. Additional pledges reduced the deficit by \$11,500. It is not too late to make a pledge. Additional cuts were made. Approved, with sorrow, the Administrative Assistance's hours were reduced. That will save \$6,700. St. James will also be reducing the use of Supply Clergy, saving approximately \$1,400. We will have Lay Readers do services when Fr. Jim is away. The Financial Advisory Committee was thanked for their assistance with the budget cuts.

Committee Reports

Committee Chairpersons submitted written reports which may be found in the Annual Meeting Booklet.

Property: Fred White said the Property Committee doesn't always notice everything that needs to be done. They appreciate it when members bring problem areas to their attention. He also asked that if anyone has any special talents please let the committee know. At this time there is a need for someone capable of making minor plumbing repairs. Volunteering to help with minor repairs is another way of cutting costs.

Financial Advisory: Steve Prescott thanked all members for their help. He announced that a new Copier Contract had been negotiated at a savings of \$1,300 for St. James.

There was no Unfinished Business.

New Business

Tercentennial Capital Campaign: From time to time there is a need for a Capital Campaign. A letter from the Vestry will be sent out to explain our financial situation. This will be a 5 year plan with a \$100,000 target. Steve Prescott said they are exploring options with the Diocese. Some projects to be considered are: 2nd Story Windows, Church Carpeting, Repair Church Wall around cemetery, and Refresh Women's Restroom.

Rector's Report: Fr. Jim noted that this August will mark his 10th year as Rector of St. James and that by canon law he could continue to serve another 11 years. He thanked everyone for their prayers and support during his mother's final illness.

In addition to his written report Fr. Jim spoke about his **Four Part Proposal** made at the 2010 Annual Meeting. **The Prayer Ministry** is not fully developed at this time. **The Financial Advisory Committee** worked with Sam White to develop the 2012 Operating Budget and continues to provide assistance to the Vestry. **Spiritual Leadership** is still being developed. **To Discern and Claim a Godly Vision** is still hanging out there. There are glimpses of it in all of our ministries.

A special Thank You to the Vestry for preparing the delicious dishes served at this morning's brunch.

- You have NOT attended a free skin cancer screening before.
- You have never had a skin cancer screeing by a physician or dermatologist.
- You do not have health insurance.
- You have a family history of skin cancer, or if you have a sore that won't heal.

The Education session will include information on Self Examination, Risk Factors, and How to Protect yourself and your family.
